In this pack are lots of different ideas for things you can work on at home. Have a go and see how you get on!


Remember that if you have internet access, there are lots of things on eSchools for you to do. If you log into your eSchools page, you can send messages, or look at the

Write a letter to your favourite book character.



Discuss the child's favourite book character. Provide materials for letter writing. Encourage the use of full stops and capital letters to complete each sentence. 2

Find different jugs and cups.



Use these to make different potions.

Classroom secrets*

Encourage children to compare the sizes of different jugs and cups. Ask children to describe the capacity of each jug, using language such as full, half full and empty.



What did you do?

Classroom secrets*

Encourage the use of time related language, for example: first, then next. When tasting, talk about the smell, taste and texture.



Practical Ideas





Go on a number hunt. How many numbers can you find?

Encourage children to find different pairs of objects. Discuss what the word 'pair' means. Children to count the pairs in 2s to find the total.

Children to find full packets of food and read the weight measurement displayed. Compare the weight using language such as heavier, lighter, less and more.

Children to explore the house and record the different numbers they can see. Encourage the children to compare, order or sort the different numbers.




Practical Ideas



Encourage children to use language to compare the height, e.g. taller than, shorter than. Toys can be ordered from shortest to tallest or tallest to shortest.



Discuss 3D shapes. Encourage children to name the shapes they have found. Sphere, cube, cuboid, cone, cylinder. Can they sort the shapes?



Children to roll a dice to generate a number. Encourage children to find different objects around the house to represent the number, e.g. 4 spoons, 4 shoes, 4 buttons.


Talk about how long 30 seconds is. Did it feel a long time? Can you count your own jumps? How many more/less jumps did you do?




Write instructions on how to play your favourite game.


Spotting Game	l Spy	Twenty Questions	Den Building	Treasure Hunt
Make a list of things to find out on a walk or in the garden (e.g. a tree, a bird, a petal, something 'yellow', something that starts with every letter of the alphabet (A–Z), a snail, a leaf etc.). You could take photos and create your own spotters' guide!	Choose an object and use the phrase I spy with my little eye, something beginning with the letter See how many guesses it takes for someone to find out what you've chosen!	Play with someone else! Think of something and then the other person has to ask up to 20 questions to guess what it is. You could choose from different categories like an animal, a vegetable or fruit or something that moves!	Create a den so that you can do some reading outside. Think about keeping warm and dry! Once the den is made, sit back, relax and read!	Collect some items from outside (e.g. a shell, a flower or a pebble). Create an exhibition by writing a label and a caption for each item. (e.g. This is a It is)



A little girl visits her grandma who looks rather different. She seems to have furry ears, big eyes and a long nose!







A witch puts a spell on a boy and turns him into a beast. He lives in a castle and falls in love with a beautiful girl.


