Maths tasks (aim to do one a day)

- Play maths games in the homework area of Education City.

 Aim for 5-10 minutes a day, if you can.

Reading tasks (aim to do one a day)

- Read a book or listen to a story (every day if you can).
- Design a bookmark which shows your favourite book(s) or character(s).
- Complete a reading comprehension (see eSchools).
- Read the fact cards about Kenya and have a go at the quiz to see what you can remember. (See eSchools).

Spelling/ Grammar tasks (aim to do one a day)

- Practise spelling our 'Word of the Week'.
- Identify nouns, adjectives, verbs and adverbs. (See eSchools).
- Find the common exception words in the word searches. (See eSchools).
- Unjumble the letters to spell common exception words. (See eSchools).
- Play spelling/grammar games in the homework area of Education City.

Writing tasks (aim to do one a day)

- Write sentences using the 'Word of the Week' or words from the spelling tasks.
- Improve the sentences by adding an adjective and an adverb to make them more exciting. (See eSchools).
- Imagine that you have been on safari. Write a postcard to a friend or family member to tell them all about it.
- Create an information page or leaflet about Kenya.
- Practise your handwriting, thinking about the size of each letter. You could try some joins.

Other things to try out this week:

Theme: Kenya

- Find out about the Maasai tribe. Have a go at some African-inspired creations e.g. a patterned necklace, an African drum or your very own 'jumping dance'. There are some suggestions on eSchools or you may have a good idea of your own.
